


Mrs Soo's Five Faves

To help families streamline purchasing decisions and match readers with books they'll love, here some fabulous resources to explore.

Non-Fiction

Explore Your World: Weird Wild Amazing (2019) by Tim Flannery. Are zombie jellyfish real? Which animals eat poop? And more importantly, why? Will a vampire bat suck your blood? Which insect drinks tears? I know many of our curious RSPS students will



love this fabulously illustrated non-fiction book by Professor Tim Flannery. It's bursting with the most bizarre facts!

Early Stage 1
Little Ned by Michael Wagner and Adam Carruthers (2020).
Ned has a favourite outfit that he wears everyday. Every morning, Little Ned puts on his pants, his shirt, his shoes and, while he's at it, his heavy-duty



chest armour, his spikey metal gauntlets, his razorsharp sword and his iron helmet. One can't be too careful, can they? This book is brilliantly drawn, funny and heart-warming. This is easily one of my favourite picture books of 2020 so far.

Stage 1

The Bad Bassinis by Clair Hume and Tom Jellett (2020). The Bad Bassinis do all sorts of horrible things to the other dogs in their town. When Pipsqueak meets the Bassinis, their lives start to change. This is a book about



bullying and courage. This is a valuable resource for conversations about how people react to the way that others treat them.

Stage 2

Frankie Fish And The Sonic Suitcase by Peter Helliar (2017). This is the first book of the junior chapter book series for 9-12 year olds by Australian comedian Peter Helliar. I am recommending this series because RSPS students have asked me to help them hunt down these books in our school



library. This first book is a fun time travel adventure. There's plenty of fun going on, a bit of history and some silly moments. There are currently five books in the Frankie Fish series. I'm sure there will be more.

Stage 3

The Glimme by Emily Rodda and Marc McBride (2019). This gripping tale of courage, magic and adventure has been shortlisted in the CBCA Book of the Year: Younger Readers category. From the CBCA website... "Fantasy at its finest is found in this gripping read, where the spooky village of
